From The Registrar.

It is always interesting for me going through the results checking on the registrations. Last month it appears that I was not very diligent and a number of spelling errors in the names got through I hope I have corrected the situation this month.

Quite often I come across names which I cannot find in registration despite trying all the permutations that I can think of with the letters. I do not always make mention of these but usually when I do some one comes to the rescue with an explanation which opens the door. This month there were 2 names I have been unable to resolve. The first is *Cym*. Bee-Fudge – there is nothing I can find even close to this. The other is Either *Dtps*. or *Phal* Idas 'Lucky Nuru'. There are 3 Phalaenopsis registrations - Ida's Fire, Ida's Medalions and Ida's Stripes and also a *Phal*. Idasighs. If anyone can shed some light onto these names please let me know at the meeting, and the outcome will be in the next gazette.

I consider seedlings to be an important part of growing orchids and every grower should have some seedlings in their collection. You could say that the growing of seedlings is the life blood of orchid growing because it is through the growing of seedlings that the quality of orchids is improved. Now you won't always get a show winner but there is great antic ipation in waiting for that inflorescence to open - will it have a good flower count, what colour will it be, how big will it be, what will the shape be like? This is why I introduced a seedling class at the Club meeting Floral Competition some years back. It is important also to recognise that a mericlone is not a seedling since it is supposedly identical to the parent plant, which was a successful seedling to warrant being mericloned, even though you may have purchased it as a very small plant, and grown it on to flowering. Simply stated, a seedling is the first flowering season of a complete plant grown from seed. However if it is a progressive flowerer then it remains a seedling for the first 3 flowers only. But don't forget that the rules of the club require you to have owned the plant for at least 6 months before you can show it. I am hopeful that next year we may introduce a medal or trophy for the best seedling of the year as do some other clubs. This will be done by the judges selecting the best seedling at each meeting and show and awarding it points for quality. At the end of the year the points for each plant are averaged and the highest points will win. So don't forget to identify your plants as seedlings to be in the running for this.

A note from your Editor

Your Committee works tirelessly toward making your Club a success. However more than time your Clubs needs to ensure a regular income apart from commissions on plant sales at shows.

This is done by levying a yearly subscription on members and varies as to whether you are joint, single, country etc. (presently \$28.00, \$22.00 \$18.00)

This fee however does not actually cover the cost of the monthly Gazette when it is posted to you.

I believe that it is time to move to a 'Family Membership' of \$21.00 per annum and to contribute a small monthly cost of say \$2.00 per person.

A family membership means that a husband/wife/children or a Single/partner/children can attend for the one low subscription plus \$2.00 each at the door.

The \$21.00 subscription represents a \$7.00 reduction from last years subscription for joint membership and \$1.00 reduction for single membership and is easily divisible to a monthly amount for those joining after April any year. While apparently leaving the Club wanting, the shortfall will be made up by the monthly door entry fee.

This fee will provide each person with 2 raffle tickets in the monthly raffle and will include supper (More raffle tickets can be purchased if desired).

We are one of the few Clubs offering a very comprehensive and tasty supper, which usually costs the Club around \$30.00 per month. The present raffle which we run raises about \$60.00 per month.

I believe that a \$2.00 entry/door fee will raise approximately \$100.00 (based on 50 people attending) leaving the Club with approximately \$70.00 after supper (against \$30.00 presently).

The increase of \$40.00 per meeting should cover the shortfall in subscriptions while giving us a more regular income.

The system should make paying the subscriptions easier in February when many of us have to pay out on many other Club subs. and most of us can afford the \$2.00 each on a Club night

The \$2.00 entry/door fee has been operating very successfully at the Species Group for over the past 2 years and has on its own raised enough money after expenses to buy an expensive book for the Club library. This group is currently raising money for an Orchid registrations program for general Club use..
