Mr T. Jacob, a past president of the South Australian Orchidaceous Society Inc., gave a most valuable and informative talk about the Orchid Genera that may be grown with Cymbidiums. He illustrated his talk by referring to the many orchid books available with their excellent photographs information about culture. suggested that growers should try any genera that appealed to them, preferrably buying flowering-size plants rather than small divisions seedling. The many discussed included Bifrenaria, Bletia, Cattleya (especially summer and autumn flowering types), Dendrobium (soft-canes, native and Indian species), Epidendrum, Encyclia, Miltonia, Oncidium, Osmoglossum, Pleione, Zygopetalum and several others. The quality of the plants benched made it difficult to choose a winner for the popular vote. Eventually both the first and second places being earnt bv George Chesterman with Lc. Parysatis 'Lavender Girl' and Lc. Kindee 'The King' respectively. Third place saw a tie between George's Slc. Riffe 'Brighton Farms' and Tony Proepster's Z. Blue Lake 'Bavaria' and his Chocolate Drop 'Kodama' X self. All beautiful plants. Raffle plants came from Adelaide Orchids and John Nicholls Orchids. usual Cuppa was enjoyed together with a lot of orchid chatter after such an interesting meeting. NEW MEMBERS WORKSHOP

Greta Guest spoke on pollination, followed by Bi11 Guest who showed everybody easy it is to deflask cymbidiums. NAMING OF PLANTS ON THE SHOW BENCH

I was very pleased to see that many more growers have adopted the scheme of putting plant labels on the front of plant/pot. Keep up the good work. Thank you.

It's that time of the year again when the nights get longer and colder. Because of the cold it means that the green-house is closed for extended periods to maintain heat. The decrease in outside ventilation together with lower temperatures increases the chance of fungal damage to flowers. There are a number of steps that can be taken to reduce the chance of flower spotting.

1 Make sure the glass house floor is free of dead leave etc.

2 Check that air circulation is sufficient. Install another fan if required.

3 Spray with a suitable fungicide.

As a preventative fungicide Maneb, Mancozeb, Bordeaux mixture or Zineb are suitable. It is a good idea to rotate fungicides to ensure that a tolerance to a particular chemical is not developed by the fungi.

Remember when using any chemical read the instructions and follow he safety precautions carefully. The end of April is also the time

The end of April is also the time that I take the extra shade cloth off the catt-house. I believe the additional light helps keep the plants growing strongly.

BASIC ORCHID CULTURE

THORAL TORMET

Many people consider that orchids ARE cymbidiums - probably the most widely cultivated of orchids. They are the easiest to grow and flower, readily available and inexpensive. The species originate in the Himalayan region of northern India at fairly high altitudes with warm days and cool nights during summer and dry, cool conditions in winter. Hybrids inherit similar preferences.

Ideally, the temperature range should be 18-27c for growing and 13-22c for flowering. A shade house permits greater control over temperature and light, simulating the cymbidium's natural habitat. However, cymbidiums don't require expensive housing and can be grown sucessfully even in the shade of a peach, plum or apricot tree (on the northern side). It is almost impossible to kill cymbidiums. However, they will not grow successfully on a verandah or in the shade of a heavily foliaged tree as plants will not get enough light and the leaves will become weak and floppy. Protection from heavy frosts is necessary. There are three general types: Standards-

.largest plants
.largest flowers

.flower August/September
Intermediates and Miniatures.smallest flowers
.usually smaller plants

.many more flowers

.early flowering

.like slightly warmer conditions

Growing requirements are identical for the three tyes and every collection needs some of each. Although there is a general belief that orchids are hard to grow anyone in the Adelaide area should be able to grow them well. NEEDS FOR SUCCESSFUL CULTIVATION

.maximum sunlight

.good air circulation

.ample water

.cool summer nights

AIR CIRCULATION

Good air circulation is essential for good plant growth, supplying oxygen and carbon dioxide and promoting the quick drying off of leaves thus preventing fungal, bacterial and red spider problems. The air surrounding the orchids must be moist. Bad ventilation causes poor growth and immature buds to yellow and drop off.

SHADE HOUSE

A shade house gives better control over light, air movement, watering and pests. It should be where the cymbidiums will receive the most sunlit hours during the whole day with no shade from a house, shed, fences, trees or anything else. If a choice has to be made an aspect receiving the most morning sun is best. Allow for good air movement. Do not make your shadehouse too small, allow for future expansion. Galvanised water pipe is best for frame work of your shade house. Timber will rot with the continuous moisture. Height should be at least 8ft (2.4 meters) and a gable will allow for future plastic cladding to be added to

create a flowering area. Shadecloth should be rated at either 50 or 70 per cent of black, green or white.

FLOOR COVER

In the summer months additional humidity must be provided. down black plastic sheeting with moisture holding materials such as wood chips. gravel or bark. Beside suppressing weeds, this will look neater and retain moisture. creating humidity.

BENCHING

It is advisable to grow cymbidiums on benches to avoid slugs, snails, ants, insect pests and fungal disease. Besides preventing back problems for the grower and giving easier access to the plants, benches also provide additional and ventilation assist drainage of pots. The ideal bench would be made of galvanised water pipe and galvanised 50mm mesh strong enough to carry the weight of a good number of heavy pots. A width of no more than 3ft would enable the grower to reach pot. The bench should not be too high so that the humidity from the ground cover is not lost but the same time it is still possible to clean underneath.

SPACING

Plants should be grouped benches by pot size. Small pots in larger ones will between receive their fair share of water. fertilisers and light, so keep the same size pots together. If pots are also kept in lines it will facilitate watering, fertilising, spraying and also air movement. Do not overcrowd. Allow one pot space between all pots. For plants to receive maximum light, benches should ideally run north to south. Plants may also be hung in wire baskets from the roof of shadehouse, but do not overdo this as lower plants will lose light.

CATTLEYA MINERVA 'HIGHERCOMBE' grown by Mr and Mrs Guest

The large specimen plant with seven spikes fully open, three still to open, 127 flowers in all, was another C. bowringiana X C. loddigessi crossing. The flowers are different from C. Minerva 'Easter Bouquet', which was last months Flower of the Month. These flowers are pale pinkmauve with a lavender spade lip which comes from the bowringiana parent. The plant ,in a 10 inch pot, was very healthy, it was grown out with the cymbidiums so had the same culture as they had until it started to flower and then it was placed under cover.

The South Coast Orchid Club Of S.A. Inc. CONSTITUTION

The Committee recommends that the following amendments be made to the Constitution.

Clause 11. Committee of Management

- (H) Subject to clause 11 (i) hereof any member of the Committee may hold more than one position on the Committee.

 Subject to the provisions of clause 11 (d) hereof any member of Committee holding more than one position on Committee shall only have one vote.
- (I) General members of Committee may not hold more than one position on Committee and accordingly must resign their position as a general member of Committee in order to take up any other position on Committee.

Clause 25. Extraordinary Measure

- (B) 1 (i) not less than 30% of all financial members of the Club are present, and (ii) the motion or any part hereof is passed by not less than two thirds (2/3) majority of these present and voting.
- (B) 2 The meeting of First Instance by majority decision may (i) Temporarily suspend any member of Committee until the matter is determined; (ii) Appoint temporary replacements to Committee pending the final determination of any such motion of no confidence.

These amendments will be published in the next two issues of the Gazette and voted on at a later date.
