THE WAY I GROW STANHOPEAS By Geoff Spear

Stanhopeas produce truly exotic flowers, huge waxy perfumed flowers which only last a few days. Flower spikes on these species grow downwards so it is necessary to grow them in baskets. I use wire baskets lined with loose coir fibre as this makes it easy for the spikes to push through. I grow mine in sphagnum moss, though most growers use very fine bark. My Stanhopea's are hanging in my fibreglass house. I find they need a lot of water, which I reduce after flowering, feeding with a weak solution of Bloom and Grow fertilizer on a regular basis, which I stop after flowering.

The first interesting thing I found with these plants is that you can literally stand and watch them open almost all at the same time, some blooms are the size of my fist. Another interesting part of these species I have found is their perfume, Vanilla, Chocolate and many other fragrances.

A lot of interest is now being shown with Stanhopeas, so it is now much easier to buy them and there must be over 50 or so species in the genus.

Come on Orchid growers, give it a go, either try my way or the standard way with fine Cymbidium bark.

SPECIES GROUP

A nice display of species was benched at the November meeting ranging from the 1.3mtr tall *Vanda tricolor* to the tiny 5mm tall *Pleurothallis tubatus. Vanda tricolor* is a species from tropical Java. The flowers are produced on 40cm long racemes at the top of the plant from between the thick leathery leaves. They are long lasting, very fragrant, white with dense red spots. Because of the tropical nature of this orchid, along with most of the species from the genus some heat is required during our cooler months. While the flowers are attractive the plants, along with most of the genera, have an untidy growth habit with thick aerial roots that tend to wander all over the place except into the pot. These can be guided back into the pot by careful manipulation when the roots are wet and pliable. In the humid tropical areas of the world they are often grown just by hanging them from the roof of a shade house or in the open garden were

they obtain all the moisture they require from the surrounding humidity.

At the other extreme was a tiny plant of *Pleurothallis tubatus* from Central America. The fleshy leaves were just 2cms tall produced in a small mound. The flowers were 3mm long and as the name suggests tubular in shape with small yellow petals and sepals displayed along a wiry stem no thicker than a human hair. There were two other Pleurothallis species on the bench slightly, but not much, larger than the previous one, *P grobii* from the West Indies and throughout Central America, Mexico and into South Amer-



ica. This plant has densely clustered 5cm to 150cm tall pseudobulbs carrying a single leathery leaf. The greenish white or yellow 5mm flowers do not open fully and are distributed along a 10cm peduncle where they gently nod in the breeze attracting pollinators.

The other Pleurothallis was an attractive unnamed species having similar flowers to the other two.

The meeting was concluded with an interesting power-point presentation by Ron on the genus Stanhopea a real eye opener as to the number of species in this weird Genus.

At the next general meeting of the club on the 3rd December the focus will be on species orchids so please bring along any species you have in flower for the interest of all the members.

APHIDS

Aphids are soft insects that have a piercing and sucking mechanism that sucks out the sap of the plant it



is on. They are normally in colonies on the underside of leaves and buds that are fresh and newly growing. Aphids are seen around this time of the year and are usually seen on pruned rose bushes making up new growth and flower buds. The leaves will wilt and turn yellow and some of the sensitive leaves on your rose bush the aphids cause the leaves to shrink, distort and curl and also cause malformed buds.

The aphids produce large amounts of a sugary liquid waste called "honeydew" and this drops onto the leaves. A fungus called sooty mould can form on these deposits thus turning the area black. The appearances of this mould on the leaves indicates infestation and the small black sugar' ants it attracts also is a pointer to some sort of problem happening on the plant. These fellows can also contaminate your orchid growing area and cause a lot of damage if not controlled. There have been some reports of these pests as being a vector for viruses but this has been difficult to substantiate. The aphids being flyers come to your plants in small numbers initially in the search for a suitable host to settle on. They then deposit several wingless young on the most newest and tender leaves and buds on the selected plant. These young then feed on the plant and grow in size and mature in 7-10 days and are then ready to produce live young themselves. All of these are female and produce 40-

60 young at a time and as this is repeated many times it is not long before you have a very large population explosion. You then have hundreds of thousands of aphids on your plant within a few weeks. When the plant becomes overcrowded and stressed this is the time that aphids with wings are produced and these then fly off to search out a new host and start a new infestation.

To control aphids you need to inspect your plants regularly under new leaves and buds, if they are there it will not be long before they will multiply by the thousands. Small numbers can be crushed and wiped off with your fingers. Most of the controls for these aphids are direct contact insecticides but you may not get all of those that are hiding. You can also use products such a pest oils that will suffocate the aphids. You need to be careful with oil, as it will harm some of the more sensitive orchid leaves. (*Phalaenopsis*). Insecticidal soap is a good one to use and others would be the more deadly types such as Malathion and Dursban. Whatever you do use you need to have at least another two or three follow up applications every 2-3 weeks. The other thing to remember when using chemicals is that you may be killing all of the "Good Guys" such as Lady Bugs and Lacewings.

Some species of aphids produce the curled leaves, if this happens then when spraying these mongrels are protected inside the curl of the leaf. Well it appears as though you need to really concentrate on these bugs so they do not get a big hold within your collection. Be observant and keep a good lookout not only inside your growing area but outside as well. You may be able to get rid of these outside before they enter your growing area. Make your neighbours aware of these problems also because aphids are flyers they could be coming from their yard to your yard also.

ORCHID BARK by Ron Boyd

Bark is the basic ingredient in the potting mixes that most orchid growers use. If you ask fifty growers, you will most likely find that they use fifty different potting mixes! Generally, I use a mix comprising treated pine bark (85%), gravel of equal size (8%) and diatomite (7%) for my Australian native dendrobiums, paphiopedilums, cymbidiums and cattleyas.

In Australia we are fairly lucky when it comes to supplies of orchid bark. Over the last 70 years or so many Pinus radiata plantations have been established in the southern states, providing a renewable and sustainable source of pine. South Australia has the ability to supply nearly all Australia's demand for Pinus radiata bark. I have used this type of bark in the potting mix for my orchids for many years.

Pine bark is supplied in many different grades, and is suitable for most of our orchids. Choose a grade appropriate to the size of pot and the character of the orchid's root system. Pine Bark, as sold for Orchid mix, is usually composted or treated to remove any compounds that are toxic to orchids roots. This is very important, as, in my opinion, the use of untreated bark is deadly to orchids.

When bought freshly bagged, pine bark is usually moist, has an earthly smell and is ready to use immediately. If I don't intend to use it all straight away, I usually allow it to dry out; it can be stored for several years without deterioration. When I need to use this stored bark, I soak it for 4-5 days in a drum of water to which I add a small handful of lime. Then I drain the drum and allow an hour or so for the surface of the bark to dry out a little. You should never use dry bark, as orchid roots need a moist potting mix. Dry bark is very difficult to re-wet and tends to absorb moisture from an orchid's roots. If for some reason you need to use the dry bark in a hurry, use hot water instead of cold, and allow it to cool down naturally. It will be ready for use within a few hours. The hot water treatment will also kill any snails present, including any tiny garlic snails. Having planted my orchids in fresh moist bark, I flush the pots well with water, until all fine bark and dust has been removed. Then I give all the plants a good soaking with seaweed extract or a treated stock blood product called Garden Party, which provides the orchids with beneficial microbes and mycorrhiza. This treatment allows the plants to settle in guickly and encourages new root growth. I sometimes use these products several times before applying my usual chemical fertilizers.



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
