Epic coriifolium

This species apparently hails from Guatemala through to Mexico & Peru The flower is quite fleshy and is about 2cm across basically green but flushed with red/brown

I grow my plant in with the Cattleyas but hanging closer to the light. Canes on this species can grow to 300mm or so.

HISTORY OF NESBITTS ORCHIDS

The business commenced trading in 1975 as "L T & M K Nesbitt', a partnership between husband & wife Les & Kay. The nursery stock was propagated from a hobby collection of native orchids, acquired over a 10-year period from 1965. The business operated from 18 Cambridge St. Vale Park SA and was mainly mail order with some retail sales. Propagation was mainly by tuber division with some seedlings germinated around mother plants. Cultural techniques were worked out during the 70's in collaboration with other growers in SA and Victoria. Hybridising started in the mid 70's and the first hybrid, Diuris Pioneer, was registered in 1980.

Land had been purchased in 1973 at Kersbrook in the Adelaide Hills and gradually a nursery was developed on this site. From 1978 the Kersbrook nursery was opened to the public on Sundays during the



growing season and at other times by appointment. Retail sales increased and wholesale sales commenced. A laboratory for raising seedlings in flasks was established. Sales stock was all propagated at the Nursery. Those orchids that could be successfully grown on were added to the nursery stock list.

In 1983 a bush block at Marble Hill was purchased for use as an outdoor propagating area. Some 22 species of orchids occurred there, which were hand pollinated every year. The number of plants increased some 100 fold and some seedlings were potted and used for producing seed for flasking,

In the mid 1980's, with new laws imminent to restrict native vegetation clearance in SA, farmers cleared bush land at an alarming rate The Native Orchid Society of SA organised many rescue digs when permission could be obtained lawfully and specimens Of a wider range of species came into cultivation during this period Some of these plants are still surviving in pots of the original soil today. The plants have been a source of seed for propagation experiments and our hybridizing program.

In the Past 15 Years the opportunities for rescue digs have been few. In 1992, on death of M.K Nesbitt the Nursery name was changed to Nesbitts Orchids.

In 1993 a bush land property was purchased near Bridgewater in the Adelaide Hills with the objective to set up a nursery on retirement in the future and to conduct conservation trials. By 1996 with a new wife and baby there was little time for orchids. The Kersbrook Nursery and all surplus stock were sold. Samples of all the species available were retained and moved to Vale Park, The business wound back to mainly mail order. Over the post two years a small experimental growing area has been set up at Bridgewater for seed propagation experiments using fungal cultures to assist in planting out flasked seedlings from the laboratory. The Marble Hill property was sold in 2000 to raise funds to develop the Bridgewater property. Nesbitts Orchids has recently become more diversified branching into exotic orchids as well as the traditional Australian terrestrial species and hybrids of the first 25 years. The Nursery can be expected to evolve further to remain viable into the future for these are difficult times for orchid nurseries.

Cymbidium species devonianum

and its hybrids

devonianum is native to northern India, and originally brought into cultivation in the 1830's, and named in honour of the Duke of Devonshire, one of the early growers. Spring flowering, the base colour in the flowers is light green, on which are super-imposed small spots of crimson to brown over almost the entire flower.

The labellum is also light green with pronounced spotting and blotching of deep purple/crimson. It grows in the wild where the humidity is high, in broken shade; on moss covered trees or rocks where humus and leaf litter abound, at an altitude of about 1500 meters. For Adelaide growers of devonianum and it's hybrids, a big problem is 'leaf tip burn' caused by poor Adelaide

water and hot dry summers.

Keith Andrews, a devonianum expert made a notable devonianum cross using Western Rose to give us Bulbarrow.

Andy Easton took this a stage further, using a high ploidy (possibly 6n) High Sierra 'Green Glory', with devonianum to make the highly awarded 'Jack Hudlow'. To reach shapes this good in one generation is amazing and shows what can be achieved in one single step. Andy followed up with the primary hybrid Vogelsang (devonionum x insigne), and then using using a tetraploid form of Vogelsang (Eastbourne 4n), along came two excellent crosses, using Radiant Harry and Sensation to produce Richard Tauber and Rom Runner respectively. This type of cross proved a breakthrough, as spikes are not always pendulous in this line, due to strong insigne influence. The next generation of crosses using Richard Tauber, Jack Hudlow, Rum Runner, Enterprise Voyager (James Tee Kirk x Vogelsang, and the cross of Last Tango (Tropic Night x devonianum) with Brock Street (Mayfair x devonianum) to produce Street Tango have all produced excellent results.

Another distinct line are miniature crosses such as Brock Street with Miss Muffet (devonianum x pumilum) to give Tuffet, (Brock Street x Tom Thumb), produced Mem. Marvin Gage, and one of the most unusual crosses, Devonianum Odyssey (erythrostylum x devonianum) with its star shaped flowers in pink and white with solid red lips.

The current danger in the latest breeding is losing the appeal of the species, the perky and long spikes of Plush Canyon and the like, are being left far behind with the modern breeding, but didn't we first use devonianum for just that reason? There is no doubt the genetic input of devonianum has improved the quality of intermediates otherwise derived only from Cym. pumilum.

Labeling Your Plants

Recently there have been several plants, at the Cultural Meeting and also the Show, that have had the wrong labels on them. If the plants have the wrong labels and are judged in the wrong division because of this, when the mistakes are picked up it is too late to rectify the prize decision and so they are not counted in the Aggregate Point count or recognised in show results. It is up to the individual members to make sure they use the correct labels which are yellow for Second Division, Buff or off-white for First Division and Green for Open Division. The card labels are used for the Cultural meeting and for the present, plastic labels are used for Shows. If you wish to re-use the card labels they can be laminated with sheet laminate and then the writing can be removed by using methylated spirits or nail enamel remover. The same can be done with the plastic labels. Labels are available from the Treasurer's table at the cultural meeting. Jane Higgs
