DAYTIME CHAPTER by Ruth Clark

On a absolutely superb November day Keith Northcote welcomed over 30 members to the Meeting. Members were advised of the 1995 A.G.M. and encouraged to nominate for positions on the Committee.

Keith then handed over to Helen Edwards to take us on a Hawaiian Fantasy.

HONOLULU by H.J.Edwards

We left Adelaide at 11.30am Wednesday morning and arrived at Honolulu Airport at 8.30 am Wednesday morning. No I haven't made an error we crossed the date line so gained a day. Well I suppose you can say we gained a day. After spending so long in the plane another 12 hours of sunshine is a little hard to take.

Our first port of call after the Hotel, where we stayed on 44th floor with a magnificent view over the tall buildings of Waikiki, Diamond Head etc, was the Blaisdell Exhibition Hall. What a hive of activity. It was putin day for the 55th Annual Orchid Show, 'A Hawaiian Fantasy'. African Violets, Anthuriums, Bromeliads, Bonsai Plants, Cactus succulents, Corsages and leis, Orchid plants and cut flowers and Orchid badges were all being put into displays. Approximately 37 displays all. Probably what amazed me most was the number of people sitting screwing newspapaper. Now I have seen and been involved in a few displays and know of a few uses for newspaper but I couldn't quite fathom out what was to happen to this paper. I had to show my ignorance and ask. Quite simple really it was to be the base of the displays that would later be covered beautiful with moss. And displays they turned out to be. (three included waterfalls and mini-mountains) Carmela Orchids, H.& R. Nurseries, Orchid Center, James Mc Cully

all names that we had only read about before had displays. The plant that really caught the eye even before the displays were finished was a magnificent specimen of Aerides lawrenciae .It was no surprise to later discover that this plant, had won the Governor's Trophy for Best in the Show, Best Species Orchid, Best Flowering Specimen Plant, received an A.M. with 82 points and a Certificate of Merit with 87.6 Cultural points. The same grower also won Best Strap Leaf Vanda with a near purple-black Vanda Pat's Delight, this plant also received an A.M. with 81.8 points. The five boxes of Cymbidiums from Orchid Club of South Australia members that we had taken over were received with much delight . These, along with dendrobiums, vandas oncidiums and from Japan, Taiwan and Thailand formed a large cut flower display. The South Australian flowers winning the Best Group Display of cut flowers.

Being hobbyist Cattleya growers ourselves we were verv interested in the prizewinners in that genera. Best Cattleya in the Show was Pot. Sally Taylor 'Red' grown by Carmela Other Color Orchids. Best Cattleya was Blc. Toshie Aoki x Pot Sally Taylor from Carmela who also had Best Phalaenopsis, Phal. Hakalau Queen 'Cat Heaven'. The Cattleya that really caught our attention though was Blc. Warne's Legacy. It didn't win a prize in the show but it could have a place in our glasshouse anytime at all.

It was interesting to see an Orchid Show that had no Cymbidiums (except the SA cut flowers). Dendrobiums, vandas, phalaenopsis and paphiopedilums

were probably represented the most. A group of Paphiopedilum Maudiae 'The Queen' had stems 20" least at Paphiopedilum Red Maud Starship that was awarded an A.M. with 82 points had come from Illinois, U.S.A. It controlled arown in a glasshouse as the temperature there gets many degrees below freezing. There were many plants that we hadn't seen before including Oeniella polystachys, and Cycnoches ventricosum.

Our stay in Honolulu was enhanced by a day spent visiting Kodama Orchid Nursery, Kiilani Gifts and Gardens, S. & W. Orchids and Orchid Centre with Dr. Yoneo Sagawa and a group of 38 Cut Flower growers from the Phillipines. If you think people at shop sales are pretty 'ruthless' you should see cut flower growers at nurseries.

We only spent 1/2 day at the Show and one day visiting nurseries on Oahu and spent the rest of the time sightseeing any other tourist. like walk up Diamond Head was pretty strenuous to put it mildly but well worth the effort as the view is superb. The trip around the Island on The Bus is a must, especially if you get up early enough to stop off and see the sunken U.S.S. Arizona. 6 days was not long enough. I guess we saw the 'Must Sees' but could have easily spent a few more days there. We then went to the Big Island or to be correct, Hawaii, for 3 days and once again ran out of time. We went to Carmela Orchids, which was a must for me, (and a couple of other nurseries) we also went around the island, and to the Volcano National The Volcano is still Park.

active, you can walk right up to spots where steam is coming out of the ground. Of course the surrounding area where the lava has recently flowed is black, however, about a mile or so down the road there is a lovely rain forest.

The only things that are stopping us from returning to Honolulu for a better look around are the cost and the 9 hour plane flight from Cairns or just over 9 hours from Sydney. The pilot on the return to Sydney not only 'drove' into every pot hole on the route but I think he detoured a bit to find a few more.

However, if YOU have the opportunity to visit this interesting group of Islands,

GO, and if possible for longer than 9 days and preferably to see the next Annual Orchid Show.
