To consider, and if thought fit, to pass the following resolution:-

#### INDEMNITY

#### EASY TO GROW

A small orchid that is easy to grow and flower was seen and smelt on the 3 division benches in June. It is Liparis reflexa or the Yellow Rock Orchid. It naturally occurs in Southern Queensland, NSW north of Sydney, coast and ranges, growing in dense matts on rock ledges or in crevices. Flowering time is between March and May. A raceme can carry up to 30 small yellow/green very 'perfumed' flowers. (The perfume is not one you would wish to bottle.)

# CYMBIDIUMS (cont) by Alvin Bryant Yellow Standard Cymbidiums.

The dramatic change in colour breeding predicted in 1993 has now occurred. The most spectacular gain in the yellow standard cymbidiums. There wasn't a cross, and best of all the useable yield was extremely high. In the past yellow crosses have been slow movers in the nursery. Once bright yellow flowers with contrasting clear red V-marked a few 'washy' labellums ( and colours) were obtained, the community pots on hand soon disappeared. Cym. Winter Advent x (Alvin Bryant x Jean Slattery) 'Wattle' and 'Beryl' had yellow flowers with dotted labellums. Cymbidium Coraki x Winter

Advent 'Bullion' was a vivid clear yellow with a contrasting lip, while the cross Coraki x Tongariro gave similar colours with good ward potential, although some did not open as well as I would have liked - they were too filled in ! The cross (Rampur x Winter Wonder) x Coraki produced seedlings with beautiful spike habit and a range of flowering times. The clones 'Winter Strike' and 'Gloria' were noteworthy.

It is too early to pin-point the best varieties for June, July and August, as their flowering time may vary for the first season or two. The spread of flowering time into September and October has yet to occur. Crosses using Tongariro which has the late flowering Irish Melody as a parent) or Lunara (which has the late flowering Wallara as a parent) will be selected. At present more of these crosses have to be flowered to select the flowering clones for breeding. Mayflowering yellows will be sought by inter-breeding crosses with Trigo Royale in their parentage, example Cymbidium Tracey Reddaway and Cymbidium Wombat.

#### Pink Standard Cymbidiums.

always thought that the development of pink standard cymbidiums would be the easiest. In fact, it has been the hardest. Most pinks tend to be mauve-pink, striped, too 'washed out' or uneven. The white Cymbidium Early Bird 'Pacific' was the starting point to gain early flowering. It was crossed with an August-flowering clone of Sheba with flat, Lolly-pink flowers of good shape and good spike habit. From this cross Sylvania 'Sonnet' was chosen. Although its spoilage was high, it manifested, and passed on, good shape and colour. The high spoilage was partly the result of seeking very soft pinks for the cut flower market. When crossed with the tetraploid Baltic 'Leanne Sessions', it gave Sylvan Star. Flowers were generally a soft, even pink, enhanced with beautiful labellums with yellow centres and blushed edges. Sylvan Star 'Elegance' was chosen as the key parent.

Cymbidium Sylvan Star 'Elegance' was crossed with Solana Beach 'St. Francis', Rincon'Clarisse', Cronulla 'The Khan' and others. It was not ecxpected that the beautiful lip or soft colour would appear in crosses of the first generation, but it is expected in inter-crosses of the next generation, due to flower shortly. Based on the magnificent size, shape and spike habit of seedlings, such as Sylvan Beach 'Michelle', spectacular results may obtained. One July-flowering seedling (Sylvan Star x Cronulla) 'Pink Halo' with outstanding shape and stunningly beautiful colour, has given a preview of things to come. Another example is (Sylvan Star x Sylvan Flame)'Splash', a Juneflowering even pink with magnificent yellow-centred labellum, good shape and fine spike habit. Ideally, the aim of any cross is to mass-produce flowers of a particular design to a certain standard. This was almost the case with yellow crosses of Cymbidium Coraki 'Margaret', and it is now happening crosses Cymbidium Lancashire Rose 'Maureen'. Although this tetraploid clone does not have good shape, it can impart it to its progeny, while its fine spike habit and good base flower form dominate. Its seedlings are definate pinks (often with pleasing white tepal centres) to genuine reds. Logically, this parent was crossed with particular Sylvan Globe clones, because of the high shape inheritance from both their parents, Sylvania 'Sonnet' and Hamsey 'The Globe'. Surprisingly, many of the seedlings had fine, long racemes. In the few seedlings of (Lancashire Rose x Sylvan Globe) to flower, the clone 'Cosmos' had perfect form, another clone had rich flat nut-brown, fully rounded, flowers on long upright racemes, and a third was a fine red.

#### Red Standard Cymbidiums

In the previous update, little could be said about the development of red standard cymbidiums. Unlike other colour areas, where substantial development occurred using spontaneous tetraploids (before colchicine-created tetraploids were

available), the development of red cymbidiums had to wait until some outstanding diploids were converted to tetraploids with colchicine, or they arose naturally during the mericloning operation.

When in New Zealand several years ago, I made the comment that New Zealand hybridisers had made good progress in developing red cymbidiums, whereas it had languished in Australia. This occurred because the pot-plant market had been very viable in New Zealand, whereas in Australia the emphasis was on pastel flowers for cut flower export market. Ironically, there was pressure on growers in each country to reverse the emphasis. The Australian market had to pay more attention to the local pot-plant trade, while the New Zealand growers found their potplant trade hopelessly glutted, and had to turn to the export cut flower

I had not been involved in red development for two reasonsit would slow me down on the development of the four base colour for the export trade, and -I did not think that the available genetic material was good enough. However, I was sufficiently far advanced to give attention to this area if I could gather a suitable gene bank. What happened next makes it a pleasure to live in the orchids world! In a magnificent gesture, Fred and Neil Burke of Burke's Orchids provided a plant Cymbidium Yowie Flame 'Krakatoa' and seed pods of Yowie Flame 'Krakatoa' x (Claude Pepper x Pearly Queen) 4N the reverse cross, and Gronwallo supplied a plant of a chance tetraploid in his mericlones of Terama 'Yowie Bay', Len Hockey gave me a plant of Lancashire Rose 'Maureen' 4N and Philip Brady supplied a flowering plant of Terama 'Yowie Bay'4N. These plants, together with the colchicine-created tetraploid Sensation 'Aminya', provided an adequate gene pool to develop red tetraploid hybrids. To date, there have been reasonable

flowerings of the Yowie Flame 'Krakatoa' x (Claude Pepper x Pearly

Queen) cross, which has been registered as Cymbidium Yowie Pepper. Many fine reds and browns have resulted, the best possibly being the award-standard Cymbidium Yowie Pepper 'Genghis'. In the few (Lancashire Rose x Sylvan Globe) crosses to flower, one has flowers of vibrant red, another has flowers of perfect form and a third has topclass flowers and a spectacular spike habit. We also have reports that Cymbidium Terama 'Yowie Bay' has produced some fine reds. The bulk of the seedlings have flowered in June and July, but later flowers can be expected from the Sensation 'Aminya' seedlings. In the future, we see a pathway to extend flowering into October and November by using the late-flowering Cape Bailey as a parent.

#### Green Standard Cymbidiums

Our development of green cymbidiums was not pushed at the same rate as the other colours, white particularly being the most urgent. In 1994 flowerings of Cymbidium Cronulla 'Green Gem' hybrids were beautiful, and tops for shape. Enough of the range flowered (many on tiny plants) to predict that

their impact will be as dramatic as that of the yellows.

You have been led through the update with descriptions of wonderful gains. But not many colours have been pin-pointed for each month. It is too early to state exact flowering times for the new arrivals. Without doubt, we are looking at a new era in colour development. Most of the gaps will be filled in the next few seasons. However, cymbidium development will never end, as the combinations are infinite. For instance, we have been working on a 15year program to combine the beautiful labellum of Cymbidium Miretta 'McBeans' 4N with the outstanding shape of Winter Wonder 'Josephine'. The first generation seedlings have flowered, and parents have been chosen to make the second generation.

The results are still 5 or more years away. If the results are a success, and we can incorporate the six-month life of Cronulla 'Charisma', and combine it with the work to prevent pollen caps from darkening in the heat, one day we MIGHT have standard cymbidium flowers to look at on Christmas Day!
