Cultural Advice for Native Dendrobiums

<u>Shade House:</u> Position plants so they get long daylight hours = 50% to 70% shade cloth. Do not over water in Winter.

Feeding: Growing time is Spring and Summer so feed during this time. I use Osmocote slow

release and Aquasol.

<u>Dividing:</u> Same as most plants, don't divide too small or you will wait too long for them to

flower. Best time is to wait until the centre of the plant starts to die off, then

repot.

<u>Potting:</u> Pot on regularly to keep them growing but do not overpot. Use shallow well drained

pots with 5 to 10mm bark.

<u>Pests:</u> In Spring and Summer watch for aphids, I use Maverick, they will do a lot of damage if not controlled. Scale is another pest, I use Eco Oil.

Generally Native Dendrobiums are a pretty hardy Orchid which we all like to have in our collection.

All very beautiful and lovely to see, it certainly looked like a real treasure hunt, nature sure knows how to colour co-ordinate. Thank you both so very much for sharing this great presentation with us, the members really appreciated it.

Apologies today from Mr Lance and Mrs Barbara Davis, thanks for the call, also Mr and Mrs Graham Randall, new grand-parents who went to visit interstate and a big cheerio to all the other members who weren't able to attend today.

Geoff and Lesley shared the plant commentary today, both doing a great job, thank you both. Our display table was filled with lots of mixed Genera, Oncidiums, Cattleya CTNA and Rossioglossum Grande all very well grown by the members. Congratulations to you all. The Popular Vote segment was won by Mr. Don Biebrich with a lovely plant of Oncidium Sharry Baby which had three racemes of red flowers with white on the labellum, this plant also has a great perfume. Congratulations Don, well done.

We had three birthdays to celebrate today, our guest speaker Lesley, Mrs Joan Kelly who will be 92 years young soon and Mr. Bill Clark, so we sung Happy Birthday to all, everyone was in good voice.

Our meeting was closed. Afternoon tea was had by all, thanks to all serving and kitchen staff.

SPECIES GROUP

A reduced number of members met at the April meeting of the species group, many of our number were away on holiday. However the 10 members who did come were entertained by a plant discussion and a power point presentation of the "The Orchids of Sikkim Himalayas".

Only two species were benched, both beautiful plants. Cattleya bowringiana was a striking example of this very variable orchid.

They appear in colour range from light purple through all shades to a deep magenta purple as this one was. Its native habitat is Central America where it grows on trees and rocks. In cultivation it is an easy orchid to grow out in the shadehouse through most of the year, just bringing it under cover for protection when flower sheaths appear. It produces its large flower head of up to 15 glittering, nicely shaped flowers in autumn and early winter making it an ideal species to exhibit at autumn and winter shows where it is often among the prize winners.

The other species was quite different Phalaenopsis lueddemanniana. This is not one of the large exhibition types that are often seen in backgrounds of many television shows but a delicate, pretty little species on a small plant. It is often confused with a similar species P fasciata. They both come from the same areas in the Philippines where they grow mainly on trees at low altitudes in hot & humid conditions. This gives an indication of the conditions required to grow them in cultivation. Unlike the Cattleya, to flower this genus some winter protection and heat is required, a minimum of 13c to achieve guaranteed success. The perfumed flowers are about 4cm across and are produced a few at a time over several months and may appear at any time of the year. When the final flower is produced the old inflorescence should not be cut of as kiekies are often produced on the old stem when the last flower drops off. These can be removed and potted up producing a new plant.

After a round table discussion of the orchids benched Lucy presented a power point presentation of "The Orchids of Sikkim Himalayas" The number & variety of species that grow in this area is huge, we saw pictures of Cymbidiums, Dendrobiums, Gastrochilus & many others in situ of which I had never heard of, some little tiny ones and some very spectacular ones. Orchid growing in this area of the world has been going on for many years & we saw some large cultivated displays dating back to 1910.

At the conclusion of the meeting we enjoyed a cuppa and a chat finishing off an interesting meeting.



April 2009 Benched Plant Commentary

Flower of Open Division and flower of the night: *C.* (*Ctt.*) Bactia 'forever Yours' benched by Richard and Beryl Wilson. A large well grown plant with two inflorescences carrying 17 of standard shaped open flowers, one having two more buds still to open. The flowers were 85mm wide and 75mm tall with deep purple sepals and petals and a 'rose purple' labellum, frilled mid-lobe and pale purple side lobes curved up over the column.



Flower of Second Division: C. Hemabu Surprise grown by Colin and Anne Campbell. A relatively large plant with a single inflorescence carrying two round filled in flowers, 105mm wide and 100mm tall.

Sepals and petals were lavender pink, the mid lobe of the labellum deep purple shading to cream at the base of the labellum, There was a fine edging of the same deep purple colour along the edges of the side-lobes.





Another plant benched:

Ctna. Jamaica Red 'Orchid Centre' benched by Peter and Geraldine Flavel. A single inflorescence displayed 12 open flowers and there was one more bud to open. The flowers were 50mm wide and 55mm tall and well filled in. Sepals were deep crimson, the petals were slightly darker and all were cream at the centre of the flower. The broad deep crimson-purple yellow had a small yellow highlight patch at the base crossed by fine very dark lines. The column was cream/pink.

BLACK SPOTS ON ORCHID LEAVES Brian Milligan

Virtually everyone who grows orchids has experienced black spots on the leaves of their plants. Zygopetalums are particularly prone to spotting but many other genera (especially those with broad, thin leaves) occasionally develop black leaf spots. Once these spots have developed, there is nothing one can do but wait for the affected leaves to fall naturally or perhaps to trim them with sterilised scissors if only a few leaves are affected. Leafspotting seems to occur to a lesser extent if the plants are grown with good air circulation and watered early in the day so that the foliage becomes dry before nightfall. Surprisingly, other orchids, such as cymbidiums, growing beside the Zygopetalums are generally unaffected.

Maxillarias, even those grown in heated glasshouses, are also renowned for their propensity for leaf spotting. Again, it may be minimised by providing good air circulation and avoiding wetting the foliage when watering. Some dendrochilum species with broad leaves, for example Dendrochilum macranthum (formerly known as D. magnum), also seem to be particularly susceptible.
