OrchidWiz

There were a few people interested in purchasing OrchidWiz after Roger Rankine's talk last month and wanting more information.

OrchidWiz can be purchased online from www.orchidwiz.com. There are 2 versions – the original for 2 computers and an Express version which is a cheaper version with a lot less photos, award details & cultivation information, for only one computer. If you want to compare them go to http://www.orchidwiz.com/Comparison.html for full details.

The full OrchidWiz costs \$295 + postage (standard is \$20). This price includes the ability to install the program on two computers and updates 10.0, 10.1 and 10.02! Many of the judges have this version – one on their home computer and the other on a laptop they can take with them to shows.

OrchidWiz Express costs \$75 + postage. This price allows you to install the program on one computer but has no quarterly updates. It is aimed at the beginner to intermediate grower and is available as a Free 30-Day Trial

There are 2 ways of getting the full version more cheaply.

One person buying the license and sharing with a friend - each having it on only one computer. Cost would be approx. \$155 with postage.

The other is a bulk purchase. If 5 people get together and one purchases 5 licenses to be shared, it works out at \$210+ each (postage is less). The above sharing can also occur bringing it down to approx. \$105 each.

If you are interested in being part of a bulk purchase, please contact Lucy. We must have 5 full licenses for the bulk buy but can have more licenses for the bulk buy but can have more.

March Plant Commentary

Flower of Open Division and Flower of the Night: *B.* nodosa benched by Peter and Geraldine Flavel. A very clean and well grown plant with four infloresences bearing 5, 4, 4 and 3 flowers approximately 90mm. tall by 100mm. wide. The Sepals and petals were long and narrow, about 3mm. across and very pale green on white. The large white 'heart shaped' labellum was carried on the end of a long narrow tube and was about 35mm. long and 30mm. Wide.





Flower of First Division: *C.* Valentine Day 'Rachael' benched by Michael Willoughby and Oui Ju. A plant of fifteen canes, four of which carried flowers of 7, 8, 8 and 5. Sepals and petals were the same deep maroon with a glossy sheen. The mid lobe of the labellum was maroon/purple and the side lobes, which were light pink, folded up over the column.





Flower of Second Division: Onc. Unknown benched by George Misirlis. A well grown plant with three infloresences with numerous flowers, approximately one hundred in all. Flowers were 45mm. tall by 35mm. wide. Sepals and petals were pale yellowish green overlaid with brown barring. The very long showy labellum ('skirt') was mainly strong yellow with some brown shading near the centre of the flower.





EXHIBITORS' RULES FOR SHOWS

- 1. All exhibitors must be financial members of the South Coast Orchid Club of South Australia Incorporated.
- 2. Entries are free.
- 3. Exhibitors are bound by the Constitution, Rules, By-Laws and Special Show Rules of the Club.
- 4. The opinion of the judges is final and binding and no objections or discussions regarding results will be considered, with one exception, which is an infringement by an Exhibitor of any of the Club's Rules, By-Laws or Show Rules. Any objection in this case must be lodged with the Club Show Marshall/Secretary.
- 5. The Club accepts no responsibility for any loss, damage or infection suffered by any plant or blooms exhibited.
- 6. The Club reserves the right to photograph any of the exhibits if it should so wish.
- 7. In all matters regarding the arrangement and conduct of the show (with the exception of judging) the Show Marshall/Secretary is the ruling authority.
- 8. No plants suspected by the Club Virus adjudicators of being infected with virus will be eligible for competition and such plants will be completely isolated from all other plants.
- 9. The exhibition areas will be closed during the judging. No exhibitors, the public or members other than the Show Marshall/Secretary, Judges of the Club, Associate Judges and other persons appointed to assist in judging will be allowed to remain in the exhibition area during this period.
- 10. Non-exhibitors are requested not to congregate in the exhibition area prior to judging so that officials can arrange plants and perform other necessary duties.
- 11. Plants must be labelled with the coloured labels provided by the Club with the exhibitor's number and name of plant. These are available from the Show Marshall/Secretary or his/her nominee.
- 12. Exhibitors are to ensure that all labelling be neatly and correctly performed in accordance with the procedure laid down on orchid Nomenclature and Registration.
- 13. All plants benched for judging at the show must be made available to be in the Club display for the show week.
- 14. All exhibits must be benched by the nominated time on the nominated day for judging. The nominated day and time will be published in the Club Gazette in the month prior to the Show.
- 15. Exhibits must not be removed before nominated time on the nominated day at the end of the Display week. The nominated day and time will be published in the Club Gazette in the month prior to the Show.
- 16. Exhibitors unable to remove their own plants from the show should provide the person so doing with a letter of authorization.
- 17. Damage caused in transit to the show should be reported to the Show Marshall/Secretary or Registrar of Judges prior to judging.
- 18. If, in the opinion of the judges, a plant is not worthy of an award or prize in any specified section, then none shall be given.

Obtain plant sheets and plant price tags from Lucy in the weeks prior to the sale.

Clean all pots. Wipe them over with a damp cloth to remove all white residue of salt. If these pots have been recycled from somewhere else, please make sure all advertising and price stickers are removed.

Check all stakes. Add more if needed and re-tie if necessary.

Remove old brown husks from bulbs.

Remove weeds, snails, scale etc.

Remove all dry ends on the leaves and shape to a point.

Wipe leaves over with a mixture of milk and water (1 part milk to 10 parts water). Do not add extra milk as the fat in the milk will clog the pores in the leaves which will cause them to yellow and die.

Water all plants 2-3 days before taking them in for sale. PLEASE DO NOT water them on the day you are bringing them in as the water really makes a mess on clothing and everywhere else, ea the floor.

The Sales Sheets

Have a carbonless copy.

Please use both sheets together.

Press down firmly on a hard surface to imprint on the second page.

Print your name in the top left hand corner

Print your club member number in the top right hand corner

Rule a narrow column down the left hand side of the page. This column is for plant numbers from 1-30. Please use consecutive numbering for additional sheets ie 31-60 for page 2 etc.

A slightly wider column on the right hand side is for the selling price of the plant. Be reasonable, not greedy. Either you want to sell it or not. If you are not sure, ask someone. Take into consideration number of spikes and condition of the plant.

The centre section is for the description eg Cym. Den Cat etc and the name of your plant and colour. ie Without Peer 'Soft Touch' (pink).

Give both copies of the sheet to the person checking the plants off.

If you need a copy take a third copy for yourself. However, in most cases, you will be given one sheet back with your cheque.

Price tags

Member number in top left hand corner.

Circle the plant number in the right hand top corner.

Price underneath.

It is a good idea to write this information on both sides of the tag.

Make sure that the tag on the plant matches the information on your sales sheet.

These plant price tags need to be checked off on your sheet by another person when you bring them in.

You can help by reading out the numbers and price on the tag with the other person checking off the list. If this does not correspond, it needs to be ttended to.

We hope that these notes help you. Lucy and I are always around to assist you further if needed. So just ask for help should you need it.

Orchid Culture Notes April.

April is a nice time of year and it even rains sometimes...sometimes! Weather stays warm but a decided chill at night reminds us that winter is closing in.

With the sun migrating north it loses that burning intensity and the insulating effect of humidity reduces its harshness. For many of our plants it is a time of recovery and for some the signal that the resting period is about to begin. Actually many orchids in flower are really resting!

A varied collection will have all sorts of things happening. Some rest, some begin a growth season and others may be in between. So as general as these notes are, concessions need to be made in a varied collection as to what your plants are up to. Fail to do this and the results won't be too flattering. That oncidium or dendrobium used to a dry winter rest that is constantly cold and wet out amongst the cymbidiums, is a spare pot for next year when its inhabitant succumbs.

It should be a time of year where we should start moving our plants around and increasing the light and reducing the shade. I love the orchid juggle!

Whilst for many changing shade cloth is impractical, it pays to take note of the angle of the sun at various times of the day. Sunny areas of summer with a high sun can now be shaded and sun loving orchids particularly the cyms and natives will need to be moved to a sunnier spot. Hang some of them higher up if room on the ground is at a premium.

Activities for growing your natives are similar to what we do in March and if you want to divide up sarcochilus, now is a good time. With a few cool nights and autumn showers under our belt this genera will awaken after the summer semi dormancy and push along.

Oncidiums will continue to mature and for those that grow these there should be plenty of spikes. Watch out for rats and mice. There are plenty around and hanging plants are not immune. The cooler nights will have these rodents moving to cover and succulent orchid flower spikes are high on the menu. Start baiting and trapping now, as it is no use when they have creamed the crop of spikes. That was lesson #457 from last year at my place.

I would be paying most attention now to those autumn show plants. Ensure they are staked and tied to show their best and start cleaning up all plants. No point staking them the night before.

There is something rather unspectacular when judging upside down flowers, unless it is a stanhopea.

Removal of dead leaves, flower sheaths and even dead canes will neaten them up and also remove hiding places for those OEB's (orchid eating bugs) If you can move the flowering plants to a closed protected area to keep the wind and moisture away from them the fungal problems such as botrytis (brown spots) will be kept at bay and ensure plants are kept in prime condition for the judges. Keep them cool.

Bug problems are usually slug and snails that have awoken from summer hibernation. An inspection at night after a rain with a torch early in the year will give you a good indication of how many you have. For the next 6 or so months ensure a regular baiting programme is in place. There is usually an autumn rush of aphids and mealy bugs now so keep some Malathion/white oil mix for the aphids and Confidor for the mealies handy to control infestations. Soft scale can be an issue as well. Look for ants. Find ants and you find scale. The malathion/white oil will knock them over as well. Just spray when temperatures are on the cool side.

Many terrestrials will now start growth so a gradual increase in watering will be required. They should as a rule require little or no supplementary feeding as the mix should have enough nutrient in it to keep them happy anyway. If you want then a weak organic based feed won't hurt. Maxicrop or well diluted liquid manure will suffice. Keep away from chemical feeds.

For the benefit of our newer growers there are many other genera that are easily grown out with the cymbidiums and natives and require little if any different treatment. Terrestrials are a good place to start. They can grow in a basic mix of premium potting mix and nothing more! Just water, keep under 50% cloth and presto, flowers! Not quite that easy but you will get a few. Just stick with the easy ones from the pterostylis clan (greenhoods) for starters.

Ptst. *curta* is in abundance and a great beginner orchid and as a bonus they will multiply quickly. Why do you think there is so much around! Les Nesbitt or the Native Orchid Societies Tuber Bank are two good starting points for those wanting to branch out into terrestrials.

Orchid Culture Notes April (cont.)

One of the easier hardy easy exotics to grow is Laelia *anceps*. This Mexican Laelia is quite at home mounted or in a pot of cymbidium mix and does well when hung. You can leave it outside all year and the lovely pink flowers with that dark purple labellum are quite a sight in the depths of winter. And if you can grow and flower a cym then a zygopetalum will pose no greater challenge. Just grow it shadier. There, you've increased your collection already. All these plants are easy to obtain and rather cheap. The easiest of them all is the common reed stemmed epidendrum. These are almost indestructible. I have a friend that trimmed his and placed the cuttings in a 44 gallon drum full of water. It's now the biggest specimen I've ever seen and has flowers 12 months of the year. There has been a lot of breeding within the Epi's recently and the plants have been shrunk and the flower size and colour range increased to a level that a good Epi on the show bench can take some beating.

As we go through the year I do advise the newer growers to take notes of everything of relevance. For example when does this orchid flower, rest and grow. Add notes about advice that you take from other growers and take note of what is flowering now at the meetings. I had a grower ask why there was a bench of cymbidiums in March and he had none. It will be a different story in September when his flower and the March grower had none. These notes you take from meetings and shows gives you a heap of varieties, species and clones to choose from that flower throughout the season. Before you know it you have something out all year. My collection is never without at least a few plants in flower. Green is nice, but a splash of colour breaks it up!

Cultural wise we need to be aware that warmth and humidity this time of year makes conditions perfect for fungal problems. Botytis is our enemy. It marks flowers, leaves and can rot out new growths and entire plants. Yet something as simple as keeping plants dry overnight and improving air circulation can reduce it markedly. If you had fungal problems this time last year (diary entry # 320), then start now spaying a preventative fungicide, especially if the conditions go warm and wet.

Enjoy April and the lovely weather and flowers it presents. Steve Howard

NEW SEEDLING TROPHY (name not available at this stage)

The Club has been privileged with the offer of a 'Seedling Trophy' from Sylvester Ng in memory of his sister in-law Chin Yew Lian for the Members to participate. The format will be for any Member who has a seedling of any genus to bring it to the Monthly Meeting and to make sure that it has a White Ribbon (supplied) draped over the plant. The plant and flower(s) will be judged in its normal Section and Division but also as a Seedling for that Division. The BEST seedling from each Division will be judged for 'Seedling of the Night'. The selected plant will be 'pointed' by each participating judge and the ballots will be sealed in an envelope until the end of the year. The same format will apply at the three annual shows.

At the end of the year the envelopes will be opened and the plant with the greatest averaged point will be declared the winner and receive the Chin Yew Lian Perpetual Trophy for the Best Seedling of that year; suitably inscribed for the grower to retain for the following year. The trophy will be presented annually to the winner at the Annual General Meeting in February.

How a seedling is determined

For your information:

SEEDLING: AOC Guidelines for Judging Appendix B:

A seedling shall mean the complete plant grown from seed (not a Mericlone or Meristem), flowering for the first time. It shall retain its seedling status throughout the flowering season in which it first flowers. Sequential flowering Paphiopedilums, for example retain their seedling status only up to and including the third flower.

Here's your chance to participate in a new and exciting competition, so bring in your seedlings and mark them with a white ribbon so they are not missed for judging.

Donations to the Memorial Orchid Garden are deductible for taxation purposes and the minimum entry to the register is a donation of \$100-00.


Donors can be assured that the entire donation will go to the funding of various projects that are undertaken by the Australian Orchid Foundation.
